Youth Worship/Church School During 9:30 Service



I walked outside into the chill, crisp air and gazed upwards at the stars. This particular night was cloudless and moonless and from my vantage point on Mt. Monroe road the dust of the Milky Way was hanging like a curtain of fog with fireflies sparkling all around and through. The stars seemed close enough to touch and yet at the same time the clarity of the night sky emphasized how far away they were.

I'm not much of a stargazer I must confess. I don't know much about the constellations, but I can find the Big Dipper, and the North Star, and usually Mars. Every once in a while, like this night, I have to hold my breath in awe at the mystery and beauty of God's creation. It doesn't matter how cold it is, or how warmly I'm dressed. God has stopped me in my tracks

t reminded me of God's promise to Abraham in Genesis 15, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them. So shall your descendants be." (v.5) Astronomy has shown us that what we can see of the stars with the naked eye is but a small fraction of the millions of stars and galaxies that exist. On this night, the whole sky was jam-packed with stars. I could have stirred it with a spoon.

The words of the Psalmist came to mind, "When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; what are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals that you care for them?" (Psalm 8:3,4)

The thought flashed through my head that I was actually seeing the light from where those stars had been however many light-years ago. There was a star that led the magi to Bethlehem. Some sign in the heavens that led them to the new King, the Christ-child. That star of wonder, star of light called them out of their everyday existence to a new reality, indeed, into the very presence of the "bright morning star," Jesus. I couldn't help but think of angels singing to the shepherds. "Glory to God in the highest."

And then it struck me. It dawned upon me why those stars seemed so far away, yet were so close. I was being bathed in starlight that has been shining for eons as it traveled through and beyond the universe until it arrived to caress my face and open my eyes to God's reality.

Isn't that what Christmas is all about – the Creator of the universe bathing us in love? The God of power and might, holy and awesome and wonderful comes to us, as throughout all the ages, to gift us with love and salvation, drawing near to us, even abiding with us. "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it... ...The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world." (John 1:5,9)

Then an owl hooted, and our puppy, Tucker, barked. And I went back in to the warmth and light of home. December 25th was still 6 weeks off, but Christmas had already come.

Our Present Church Building 1956 to 2023

Church Anniversary Celebrations 1858 – 1908 – 1958 – 2008

1858: With 165 members the church observed its 50th anniversary by making many improvements to the church building. Some of these included a 12 foot addition to the building, a furnace, painting of both the interior and exterior of building and the installation of gas lighting.

1908: With 400 members the church celebrated its 100th anniversary with three days of fellowship in January that year. Services featured speeches/sermons by the president of Auburn Theological Seminary, the moderator and stated clerk of the Presbytery, and the church pastor Rev. Dr. Charles Noble Frost. Historical sketches by the various church organizations were a highlight of the celebration.

1958: With 850 members the church celebrated its 150th anniversary during the first weekend in January with special services and programs which were attended by more than 700 people. Drawing the largest attendance was a speech delivered by the Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A homecoming reception and a birthday party featuring a huge cake in the model of the old church building were also part of the celebration. During this anniversary year 13,635 people attended Sunday morning worship services with the average Sunday attendance at 289!

2008: With 288 members the church celebrated its 200th anniversary year with many special events. These started in January with a kick-off service which featured the combined choirs of the Presbyterian, St. Mary's and Methodist Churches. Other events throughout the year included the Kirkin' O' th' Tartans (The Scottish Rite of Spring), Old Tyme Days with the congregation in period outfits, a float in two

parades, a homecoming service, an historical pageant, and a New Year's Eve final event which featured the filling of a Time Capsule.

This year Lessons and Carols with be held at the Centenary Methodist Church on 12/10/23 at 4:00pm.

## A Unique Christmas Gift

Have your parents told you, "We don't need a thing, just your love"? Well, if they have

considered cremation, our church offers you a solution. A very loving gift would be a niche in our Columbarium for placement of their ashes. Or if that doesn't fill the bill, plaques on one of our Memorial Walls is another loving gift!

Our Columbarium has 64 niches which can hold one or two urns. Ashes are placed in an urn. Niches sell for \$800 for one urn or \$1100 for two urns. Plaques are placed on a Memorial Wall after the person is deceased. Plaques sell for \$275.

Update As another year draws to a close, our team is studying 2023 spending and crafting a budget guide for 2024. While we did have

some months of deficits, most lines were within budget and we again, are so grateful for the Crosby endowment.

The 2024 budget will go to Session in December as we needed to wait for major obligations numbers from Presbytery. Some adjustments were made in Mission and we needed to adjust the maximum amount we were offering to potential candidates to facilitate the PNCs search. Fortunately, they can do so much of this digitally, which is a savings. It was a blessing to fill the organist and choir director lines and this was a budget neutral as Melody was paid for both.

It is good news that the stewardship campaign is running a bit above last year. It is not unrecognized that all are checking their own budgets to keep up with inflationary prices on everything. We continue to be grateful for all the support of our church and its programs.

# A "Presbyterian Adventure" Helen K. Brink

We recently hosted a sanctuary tour as a reunion event for several Haverling classes graduating in the 1960s. One of the attendees was Ellen Werner who sent the following

account of what she calls her "Presbyterian adventure." With her permission it follows here: My family moved to Bath in 1949. We are Jewish and churches in Bath were not part of our lives. My brother David's knowledge of the church never extended beyond the rooms in the basement. His Boy Scout troop held their meetings there. My interaction with the Presbyterian Church was a bit more dramatic. One summer when I was maybe 8 or 9, many of my friends were going to summer church camp. We were Brownies, we went to school, we had dancing lessons – we did many activities together. I saw no reason why I couldn't also go to summer church camp with them. It was camp! Needless to say, the idea did not sit well with my parents Harry and Anne. After much begging I convinced my mother that it would be okay. She talked to my father. He reluctantly agreed - very reluctantly. First day we met in the basement rooms and colored and played. At lunch we went outside. Going in we formed a line on the east side of the building. We were taught a song to sing as we entered and we "marched" in singing the song. That evening at dinner I was asked how it went, what did we do. I proudly stood up and began marching around the room, singing on the top of my voice, "Onward Christian Soldiers Marching As To War...." My father erupted, "Anne, enough!!! She is not going back!" That was my first and last day of Presbyterian summer camp!
