SUNDAY WORSHIP SERVICE 9:30 a.m.

Youth Worship/Church School During 9:30 Service At last, it's finally here. The marathon is almost over. The finish line is in sight. I'm writing this article a few days before Christmas. And maybe, like many of you, it seems like we've been through a gauntlet of consumerism rather than a joyous celebration of our Lord's birth. Part of that is because I've seen Christmas decorations in the stores since mid-September, and also because the Christmas craze begins after Halloween now instead of after Thanksgiving like it did when I was a child.

Historically, Christmas is a season rather than just one day. There used to be twelve days of Christmas and then a celebration of Epiphany (You know, when the wise men finally make it to Bethlehem.) on January 6th. That was the Christmas season. Christmas was just beginning on December 25th. But these days, Christmas ends on the 25th, the Christian calendar and antependia notwithstanding. When the 26th rolls around, the only things left of Christmas are the returns and indigestion. Somehow it seems that Christmas ought to be more than this one-day celebration of gifts and holiday food.

Isn't it odd, though? Isn't birth supposed to be a beginning? Of course, there's always the New Year's holiday just around the corner. That's when we begin again. But there's nothing spiritual about that celebration. Mostly resolutions that will be broken within the next few weeks. "According to Phillippa Lally; a health psychology researcher at University College London, a new habit usually takes a little more than 2 months — 66 days to be exact — and as much as 254 days until it's fully formed." (Elias Scully, The Startup, Aug 7, 2019) Resolutions only seem to lead to broken promises.

Would it make a difference if we were to ponder a new beginning for participation in God's creation and God's mission to all of us? Maybe we could spend twelve days figuring out twelve ways to pay the love of God forward? And find twelve different friends to do it with? And focus on one for each month of the year? Maybe we could envision ways in which we and our church family could positively impact our community in the coming year? Or maybe we can discover one or two ways to have a rebirth in our life with Christ? Maybe you could look for at least one opportunity that arises during each of those twelve days in which you notice God calling you to make a difference to those around you in both ordinary and extraordinary ways.

My suspicion is that this can best happen if we understand the opportunity of Christmas as a starting point rather than a finish line, as a birth rather than a birthday, as a season rather than an event. And we can enjoy the celebration of the 25th as a "bon voyage" party that kicks off the adventure. Imagine, if you will, all of us surprising or delighting the people of our community with 12 acts of blessing in creative and original ways. Even if only 50 people participated, that would mean 600 ways God's love has been dispersed by us and through us! Wow!

Of course, by the time you receive this newsletter, we'll be past the starting point of the 25th, but that doesn't mean you can't start now, or pick the first twelve days of January, or begin with Epiphany. Maybe you can put a note in December of your 2024 calendar, or cutout this article to

remind you of a different way to celebrate Christmas next year.

Can we make Christmas last more than just one day, or is this all there is to it, when all is said and done? Are hope, peace, joy, and love only candles that we'll extinguish as soon as the last carol is sung, the last present opened, and the last morsel of leftovers disposed of?

January 28 Mark 5:21-43 Jairus' Daughter Healed This year's Narrative Lectionary Gospel is Mark. Unlike the other synoptic gospels. Mark doesn't have anything related to the story of Jesus' birth. He begins with John the Baptist and Jesus' baptism. Which is why it will feel odd to jump from Jesus' birth to his baptism from December 24th to the 31st. (It was a short 30 years!) Mark is the shortest gospel and has been thought to be written first, with both Matthew and Luke using some version of Mark to write their gospels. The main point is the question asked by Jesus in the middle of the gospel, "Who do you say that I am?" Another feature, if it can be called that, is Mark's portrayal of Peter as "a failed disciple" (per Amy-Jill Levine), perhaps as a representation of a typical disciple like you and me.

HISTORY TIDBITS!

Helen Kelly Brink -

The theme of "Tidbits" this year will be about the many items that have been donated to our church, who donated them and, in some cases, why they were donated. This month donations by the Cole family will be featured.

In January 1955 eight Gorham brass offering trays were given to our church in memory of Dr. and Mrs. Ernest E. Cole, late members, by their son Robert E. Cole and others. In May 1955 a 25 bell English tuned electronic carillon installed in the church's east tower as a memorial to Dr. and Mrs. Cole by the Cole family was dedicated. Ernest E. Cole was born in Savona in 1871. He graduated from Haverling in 1892 and from Cornell in 1895. He was admitted to the New York State Bar that same year but, from then until 1916, he taught school and served as principal at Howard, Greenwood, Painted Post and Addison. In 1916 he began a successful law career and became active in politics. He was a member of the NYS Assembly in 1920 to 1922 and a member of the NYS Senate from 1923 to 1926. He became chairman of the Senate Committee on Public Education during his tenure with that group and, while serving as such, he sponsored the "Cole Laws" in 1925. Those laws provided for the centralization of schools, state aid to education, school bus transportation and uniform tax rates. In 1928 he was made a deputy commissioner of the education department. In 1940 he was made NYS Commissioner of Education. From teaching in a one-room schoolhouse to becoming head of the NYS educational system was certainly a giant step for this man who our church was proud to claim as a member and friend! In 1896 Ernest Cole married Minnie M. Pierce, also from Savona. They became the parents of

three sons – Robert Ernest Cole, William Sterling Cole and James Pierce Cole. Dr. Cole died in 1949 and Mrs. Cole died in 1954. Both are buried in Seamans Cemetery in Savona.

Skylar Lyke narrated the story telling us about how Mary (Leah Barros) and Joseph (Carter Daley) were the first visitors to wake up the innkeeper(Dalton Rook). The innkeeper's voice was narrated by Caleb Lyke. He had no room but he told them they could stay "Round the Back" in the stable. Then he was awoken by others looking for Mary and Joseph. An angel (Olivia Barros) brought bright lights and loud music.

Shepherds (Torin Lyke and Weston Daley) wanted to know where Mary and Joseph were too. The innkeeper was getting more and more upset by the many interruptions to his sleep. Finally, he decided to go "Round the Back" himself. He was surprised to find a wonderful baby boy had been born. A peace came over him as he saw the child and he shared the news of the incredible birth with the congregation.

Helen was a member of this church for over 50 years. In those years she was very active in many areas of the church.

Election night spaghetti dinner was one area she had been involved with for many years. She was in charge of the kids who were working in the dining room. She made sure they waited on the tables they had been assigned to as well as clearing and resetting the tables. If they forgot, or got busy visiting with friends, she would gently remind them.

Lenten lunches would find her in the kitchen helping to get the food ready. One of her jobs was cutting the pies. She would painstakingly cut the pies to make them look delicious. They had to be individually put on a plate and when placed on the buffet table they had to all be facing the same way, if not she would fix them.

The Tower Topics was also an area where she had dedicated a lot of years. She was an expert with getting it assembled and ready for the post office. She knew little tips and tricks for getting it accomplished.

Helen was a member of the kitchen committee, When there were dinners or luncheons, she was the one in charge of setting up the diningroom. When the dishes had been washed and ready to be put away, she always sorted the silverware to make sure the good silver was kept separate from the everyday. This was a priority to her. As clean up was ending she would always say, "leave the stove and I will come back tomorrow and clean it", and she always did.

Helen was the Church Person of the Year in 2010.

Helen is missed, but will **never** be forgotten.
