SUNDAY WORSHIP SERVICE 9:30 a.m.

Youth Worship/Church School During 9:30 Service "One of the problems I have with Catholics," my friend commented, "is that they just take the confessional for granted. You know, like they don't have to change their lives –just walk into the confessional booth, go to mass, and then return to life as usual."

I was surprised by this criticism, particularly because the same could be said about Presbyterians. Every week in worship we pray the prayer of confession and hear the assurance of pardon and then go about our lives as usual. I suspect that's true of most people in denominations that have a formal means of confession and pardon.

How authentic is your confession?

There are at least two important questions in considering the matter: One, How do you gauge genuine confession? And two, what does a forgiven life look like?

Do we really mean it when we say we're sorry? Can we really keep the promise, "I'll never do it again?" Ultimately the authenticity of confession is dependent upon the confessor, but I have found that confession that is genuine has a longer perspective than the immediate moment. It acknowledges what happened and the impact it had on those involved. It offers restitution where possible, and suggests possible ways to avoid repeating the offense in the future. But even more so, hints that the act of confession is an ongoing process to be completed in time. Saying the words is only the beginning, the follow-through is more important.

In that sense, confession is like New Year's resolutions that actually succeed. It depends on motivation and accountability for a resolution to make it past January. That is part of the follow-through.

"As far as east is from west, and north is from south, so have your sins been cast from you. God remembers them no more." Every week in worship we are reminded that our sins are forgiven—as if they didn't exist, never happened. What would it be like if we actually believed and lived that promise? Can we really forget? Should we?

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There are some sins that are (and should be) unforgettable. The forgiven life is not one that ignores or dismisses the past as if it had not occurred. It is one that acknowledges what has happened, but refuses to let the future be defined solely by the past. The identity of a Christian is not that we are "sinners in the hands of an angry God," but that we are <u>forgiven</u> sinners. By the February Worship Schedule

grace of God, we do not have to be captive to our past sins, though our lives may be defined and constrained by them. A forgiven life works toward a future that can be different from the past. A life that follows Jesus.

"Gracious God, our sins are too heavy to carry, too real to hide, and too deep to undo.

Forgive what our lips tremble to name, what our hearts can no longer bear, and what has become for us a consuming fire of judgment.

Set us free from a past that we cannot change; open to us a future in which we can be changed; and grant us grace to grow more and more in your likeness and image; through Jesus Christ, the light of the world."

# HISTORY TIDBITS!

Helen Kelly Brink -

The Candelabras, The Lighter Box, and The Library

The two candelabras located on the altar were given to the church in 1943 in memory of William Dwight Garrison, "the beloved church school superintendent", who died on 24 April 1943. Mr. Garrison was born in Kanona on 30 September 1872 to Emanuel and Esther Garrison. His first wife was Edith Ware Garrison (1879-1935). Their son William Nelson "Bill" Garrison (1916-2004) joined his father in the coal and oil business after he returned from service in World War 11. He became owner of the business after his father's death.

The lighters used to light the candelabras are stored in a wooden container at the rear of the sanctuary. The container was built by Bernard Hough and donated to the church by Dean Chatfield "in loving memory of Larry and Brenda Burton for their years of dedication to our church." The Burtons died in 2015 as the result of an auto accident.


