Celebration Sunday – October 22, 2023

We usually only think of stewardship during the Fall as we consider our monetary giving to the Lord for the coming year. Jesus spoke more about money than any other subject, but it is almost always in reference to how it interferes with our life in God. But stewardship is about more than money, or even time, talents, and other treasures. It is about the offering of our whole lives to God.

Stewardship revolves around the concept that all that we have and are come from God and belong to God. They are returned to God in order to be a blessing to our world. This is what Paul means when he says in Romans 12 that we are to offer ourselves as living sacrifices which is our spiritual worship.

But we have a very difficult time relinquishing our stuff to God. It runs contradictory to the values of our American way of life. Yet it's not <u>our</u> stuff, not <u>our</u> money, not <u>our</u> house, car, or X-Box, etc. It belongs to God, and we're supposed to use the gifts we have been given to bless others. How'ya doin' with that?

As you consider your estimate-of-giving this year, perhaps God is inviting you into a whole life inventory, with the only measure being how you have been a blessing to your family, your church, your community, and your world, and how you intend to be so in the coming weeks and months.

Romans 12:1-2; Place Your Life Before God (MSG)

So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life—your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking.

Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what he wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you.

Our Magnificent Place of Worship!

Our Present Church Building1877

to 1955

On 22 February 1877, with lawyer and historian Guy McMaster playing the organ, the new Presbyterian Church was opened for worship! The first service was described in the local newspaper as follows: At the appointed hour a large congregation assembled to look upon one of the handsomest church rooms to be found in this part of the state.... It is large, airy and roomy, without pillars or obstructions, making it one of the very best arranged rooms for oratorical effect.... Our Presbyterian friends have occasion to congratulate themselves upon the erection of so beautiful and convenient an edifice. When the towers are complete, hardly a church in western New York will be found to surpass the new church in real architectural beauty and design. And in another local paper the following comments appeared: ...and this day the beholder stood within the grand building which has sprung up from the seed of its respectable ancestor – the old white church. What a wondrous change! The new church of Venetian Gothic design was constructed of sandstone obtained from a quarry on the Davenport property. Over the years many changes and/or additions have been made to the church building. Several of the major ones will be included in this article and in the November article. The first change took place in 1894 when If you are using the church kitchen; please, please, please put things back where you found them. All cupboards and drawers are labeled for your convenience. Thank you the towers were A year later Ira Davenport, Jr. commissioned the Tiffany Glass and Decorating Company in New York City to renovate the church sanctuary in memory of his brother John Davenport. In 1896 Rev. Charles Noble Frost, the pastor, chose the verse that appears under the rose window on the south wall. The Tiffany

renovation was completed in 1897. In 1901 the church became the first public building in Bath to obtain electricity. (In 1908 membership was 400 and the church was debt free!) In 1914 the pew rental system, which began in the old church in 1868, was discontinued in favor of a pledge system such as we have today. The sliders that changed the length of seating in each row of pews to meet the needs of the renters were bolted in place. In 1922 a new basement with additional banquet and Sunday School rooms was completed. In 1955 a 25 bell English tuned electronic carillon was installed in the church's east tower as a memorial to deceased members Dr. and Mrs. Ernest Cole by the Cole family.

Hiring a new minister was so much easier, faster and probably just as efficient as the long, drawn out procedure we now must follow! In 1808 this is how it happened:

12On the 30th of May our new church drafted and dispatched the following letter to Rev. John Niles:

The Church in Bath and Congregation of said place being on sufficient ground well satisfied of the ministerial qualifications of you, the Rev. John Niles, and having good hopes from your experiences of your labors, that your ministrations in the gospel will be profitable to our spiritual interest, do therefore earnestly Call and desire you to undertake the pastoral office in said Church and Congregation, promising you in the discharge of your duty, all proper support, encouragement and obedience in the Lord. And that you may be free from worldly cares and avocations we hereby promise and oblige ourselves to pay you the sum of four hundred dollars, in regular yearly payments, during the time of your being and continuing the regular Pastor of this Church and Congregation.

On the 11th of June the Rev. John Niles sent the following reply:

Dear Brethren and Friends:

The call to settle with you in the Gospel Ministry given me by the Church, and the desire of the same manifested by so great a proportion of the Congregation in subscribing their names to an agreement for that purpose, I have seriously and deliberately considered together with all things relative to the business which I have been able to know. I have endeavored, if I am not deceived, to find out what is the will of Christ respecting this matter; and my judgement is, that duty to Christ and a regard to the good of his cause and to your spiritual welfare require me to accept the Call which you have given me.

And if the Association to which I belong shall be of the same mind, and see fit to install me as your Pastor, I shall willingly accept the important change, relying on the promised presence and grace of Christ to qualify me for the duties, and to support me in the labors and trials of the pastoral office. Let us earnestly desire the God of all grace to render the proposed relation, should it take place, a means of promoting the spiritual and everlasting well being of the inhabitants of this town. Should it prove to be so it will be well for me

The Rev. John Niles was installed as our first pastor on the 7th of July in 1808.
